Phil's Ponderings

"I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12b).

As we focus on the story of Jesus in our Year of the Bible, I've been pondering what it means to faithfully follow Jesus today. What does it mean to have and share the light of life? Furthermore, how do we publicly commit ourselves to the way of Jesus?

Some churches have altar calls, a time in the service when people can go up to the front of the sanctuary in order to make a public commitment to Jesus. Committing (and re-committing) our lives to the way of Jesus sounds like a great thing, so why don't we do altar calls at Tabor?

Well, now that I think about it, we do. When I think back over the past four months, I can think of at least seven times when we called people to the front of the sanctuary and invited them to commit (or re-commit) their lives to Jesus. The examples I can think of include Ash Wednesday (3/5), Smashing Idols (4/6), Communion (4/17), Anointing (5/4), Child Dedications (5/11), Offerings (5/25), and Baptisms and welcoming new members (6/8).

- On Ash Wednesday, we were invited to walk up front to receive ashes on our foreheads in the shape of a cross as a symbol of our commitment to the way of Jesus.
- On Youth Sunday, we were invited to think of an idol we worship, write it on a slip of paper, walk up front, and drop our slip of paper into an idol that was ceremoniously smashed, thus symbolizing our commitment to worship God alone.
- On Maundy Thursday, we were invited to gather around the cross and take communion together, thus symbolizing our commitment to be Jesus' body and embrace Jesus' new covenant.
- On Sunday, May 4, as we reflected on the pain of exile, we were invited to walk up front, be anointed with oil, and receive a prayer of blessing, thus recognizing our hope that God is present with us even through the most difficult of times.
- On Child Dedication Sunday, we witnessed parents of young children commit themselves to raising their children in the care of the Lord and we were invited to commit ourselves also to supporting these families with Christian love.
- On Celebration Sunday, we were invited to bring our offerings to the front as a response to all that God has done for us.
- On Pentecost Sunday, we witnessed baptism and membership candidates publicly commit their lives to Christ and we were invited to commit ourselves to journeying alongside of them on their journey of faith.

I often reflect on the events over the past year and say, Thanks be to God for the opportunity to serve Tabor Mennonite Church as Associate Pastor of Christian Education and Pastoral Care. Thank you for allowing me to join in your stories of happiness, pain and sorrow. You often remind me before I can say it — God is good and has been with me all these years. Yes! He does not promise an easy life. If he did, we would be robbed of our freedom. We aren't puppets on a string — rather we are free to choose God's redeeming love and grace. And if we are free, imagine how free God is to act and bring about his purposes.

I was born in Puerto Rico where my father was the CEO of the Mennonite Hospital in Aibonito, but grew up predominately in several small towns near Goshen, IN where we were members of Prairie Street Mennonite in Elkhart and then Waterford Mennonite in Goshen. I got



my BS in Business management at Indiana University in Bloomington, IN and later my Master's degree in Business Administration in Indianapolis where I moved after college. Shortly after, I moved to Chicago, working in real estate management.

Grace's Goodies

Crunchy Potato Balls

Served at February staff meeting.

2 cups very stiff mashed potatoes

2 c finely chopped or ground fully cooked ham

1c (4oz) shredded Swiss cheese or may use half cheddar

1/3 c mayonnaise

1 egg beaten

1 tsp prepared mustard

1/4 tsp pepper

2 to 3 Tbs. flour

1-3/4 c crushed cornflakes

Combine 1st 7 ingredients. Add enough flour to make a stiff mixture. Chill. Shape into 1 inch balls; roll in cornflakes. Place on greased baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 min. Serve hot. Yield: about 6 doz.



Here is our monthly marriage moment: a meaningful memento to married couples to make your marriages marvelous!

John Gottman, a psychologist who has done a lot of research on what makes great marriages points out that healthy couples know how to recognize and diffuse the power of what he calls the "four horsemen" that can erode and eventually kill marriages. The four horsemen are *criticism*, *defensiveness*, *contempt*, and *stonewalling*. This month's focus: *contempt*.

"Contempt is any statement or nonverbal behavior that puts oneself on a higher plane than one's partner." Signs of contempt in a marriage relationship: when only one person is laughing, mockery, correcting another's grammar or other minor error, and facial expression (especially rolling eyes). Left unchecked, the cycle of criticism and defensiveness can lead to contempt, which can further erode a relationship.

Marriage Challenge: Recognize contempt in your marriage relationship. When you find yourself or your spouse taking the one-up position, or when you notice some of the warning signs listed above, consider creative ways to disarm contempt. For example, intentionally remember the things you love about your spouse, seek to maintain a level playing field in your relationship, and refuse to roll your eyes no matter how much you feel like it. Contempt can sneak into a relationship over time (not quickly) and thus will take some time to remove from a relationship. If you would like more resources on disarming contempt and reclaiming your marriage, please let me know.
