Rosie's Reflections

What is the first thing we do when others treat us unfairly? Sometimes it is easier to lash out with hurtful words. We don't like to be put down or feel humiliated, so our effort goes immediately to making ourselves feel better. We get into a defense mode, but this reaction often digs a deeper pit of anger, and soon we find ourselves operating out of that anger and pain. The conflict grows deeper. We've all been there, right? What can we do instead? In Colossians 3, we find a new way to respond. The Apostle Paul asks us to consider the clothes we choose to wear each day. God has them picked out for us; all we need to do is choose to wear them. As I read verses 12-17, I am struck by the analogy of putting on God's clothes each day. If we operate out of our belovedness instead of our anger and pain, then what others think of us becomes secondary. If we put on the clothes of patience and humility, we can respond with forgiveness just as God has forgiven us, rather than returning hurtful words and actions.

There is a song in *Sing the Journey* that rings in my ears when I read Colossians 3:12-17. "*Beloved, God's chosen, put on as a garment compassion, forgiveness, and goodness of heart. Above all, before all, let love be your raiment that binds into one every dissonant part"* (Sing the Journey 38). May the peace of Christ rule in your heart, and may love be your all-purpose garment every day.

Digging Deeper with Doug

I received a call from a telemarketer the other day. He had a deep, resonant professional radio announcer voice and indeed identified himself as being a disc jockey on one of the classic country stations. He said the purpose of his call would be demonstrated to me in a 30 second sample advertisement that he would now do live. Before I could get in a word he launched into a very patriotic ad about the importance of supporting our military who have fought for our freedoms and way of life in the USA and that this announcement was sponsored by "Kreeble" Recording at 316-283-7351 (my other job). He went on with more variations on the same theme mentioning my name and number at the end once more. When he was finished, he asked me what I thought. There was a meaningful pause . . . I asked if he'd heard of Mennonites. He said yes—with a voice that no longer sounded like a professional radio announcer. I said, "Well, I am a pastor in the Mennonite Church and we practice non-participation in the military". I said I would probably not be interested in the ad. He wished me a good day and hung up before I had a chance to ask for 30 seconds of his time. The following would have been my 30 second ad:

In Matthew 5:9 Jesus blesses those who work at peacemaking and calls them children of God. Nice words, but most say non-violence doesn't work. However, in the past century there were scores of successful nonviolent movements. Most importantly, peace is the way of God--- the example of Christ. People who are non-violent have been called cowards . . . And while we know it takes courage to be in the military, we maintain it takes more courage to put your life on the line without doing violence back. Jesus was anything but a coward. "If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews." John 18. And ultimately Jesus sticks by his words, choosing to die rather than to kill. Peace takes guts. This is our legacy as Christians. As Christ's followers we are called to take the path of peace and love enemies. We believe Jesus meant what he said and he was talking to us!

Grace's Goodies

Savory Mushroom Tartlets Served at September Staff Party.

1 cup whipping cream

2 TBS snipped chives 1 TBS minced fresh parsley

Dash cavenne pepper

2 Tbs Parmesan cheese, optional

1/2 tsp salt

48 thin white bread slices, cut into 3-inch rounds 1/2 cup butter softened, divided 3 TBS finely chopped green onions 1/2 tsp lemon juice 1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms,

finely chopped 2 TBS. all-purpose flour

Spread one side of bread with 1/4th cup butter, place buttered side up in lightly greased mini muffin cups. Bake at 400° for 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool 2 minutes before moving to wire racks. In a sauce pan sauté onions in remaining butter for 3 minutes. Add mushrooms; sauté for 10-12 minutes or until mushroom liquid has evaporated. Remove from the heat; stir in flour and cream until blended. Bring to a boil; boil and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Add chives, parsley, lemon juice, salt and cayenne; mix well. Cool slightly, place bread cups on a baking sheet; fill with mushroom mixture. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese if desired. Bake at 350° for 2 minutes

or until lightly browned. Yield; 4 dozen.

OUTREACH MOMENT

52 walkers, runners and one biker gathered on October 5 at the Alexanderwohl Mennonite Church Shelter house to walk two or six miles for the Harvest Giving Walk. People from all ages took part, including four children who were pushed in strollers, to those over 70 years old. All joined together to raise money and awareness of one of the MCC projects which aides Syrian refugees. Maynard Knepp shared stories with us about the Syrian situation before we started on our walk. Area businesses donated money for participants to receive t-shirts made by Sleepy Robot (Jordan Woelk). Food was also collected from the walkers for the Tabor Food Pantry. The total amount raised was \$7,126.00 of which \$5,345.00 was distributed to MCC and \$1,781.00 to the Tabor Food Pantry. It's awesome to see the Goessel community continuing its tradition of strongly supporting overseas and local missions.

For someone living here his whole life it might not seem like this, but compared to Munich where I have more than 3000 people in my congregation it is. At home I left my parents and my Sister Lea. She is 16 and goes to a business school where she will graduate in two years. I am living with Fred and Diane Unruh and my host brother Luke. We get along really well and I am already very, very thankful for the time I had and will have with them.

Hi my name is Maxine Keyse and I am the exchange student staying with Janna and Duane Duerksen. I am from the South Island of New Zealand in a city called Invercargill. Invercargill is quite different from Goessel, but it also has its similarities. Our weather is a lot wetter and quite cold, even during summer. We are coastal and our main industries are fishing and farming. My school at home is very different than school here as it is an all girls uniform school of just under 1500 students and over 150 teachers, that's



more than we have students. So far I have had a great experience and I love the community. I am on the state team for cross country and FCCLA right now and plan to play basketball when the season starts which I am looking forward to. I am excited to be apart of the Tabor Church community, I have already made really good friends and had a lot of fun in youth group and Sunday school. I hope that I will be a valuable addition to the community and am happy to get to know more of you.
