Mennonite Church USA Convention 2017 July 4-8 in Orlando, Florida "Love is a Verb"

This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth. (1 John 3:16-18, NIV)

At the beginning of July, we had several representatives from Tabor travel to Orlando, Florida to attend the bi-annual Mennonite Church USA Convention. Rosie's Reflections

"Trust in the LORD with all your heart; and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will direct your paths."

Every time I read these verses, I think of my mom, and I can almost hear her voice reciting them. I suspect they grounded her, especially when standing on shaky ground as she must have stood many times with 6 children underfoot on our small, Midwestern Illinois farm. Although shaken from time to time, mom was firmly grounded in her belief that God would "direct her path." Shortly after she passed away, I was drawn to her kitchen calendar noticing these familiar verses headlining that particular month. These verses have also become grounding for my faith. Many years later, my daughter-in-law, not knowing this story, presented me with a bracelet to celebrate my ordination to ministry. The inscription on the bracelet was, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding."

This week my daily meditations centered on faith and belief, and the centering verse each day, you guessed it, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding." As I pondered these meditations, I wondered with the writer, Brian McLaren, what if Christians moved "from defining their faith as a settled system of beliefs" to "a force for liberation and forward movement." How am I and how is Tabor a force for the liberating message of Jesus Christ?

As we continue to focus on the essentials or our faith; Jesus as our center, Community as our life, and Reconciliation as our work, how can we be strengthened and unified even in the midst of our diversity? How might we be extensions of grace, love and forgiveness to each other; to those who look and think differently than we do? As we move forward together, may we trust in the Lord with all our hearts to direct our path, granting the Holy Spirit space to move freely in our midst, blowing where it may. "Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom."

Reconciliation Through Conversation

As we walk through life, many new things get thrown at us on a regular basis. One new experiment that occurred right here at Tabor on Sunday, July 23, was a worship service that featured a discussion in the place of a sermon. While comfort levels certainly dropped on that day, the experiment was an overwhelming success. I say this because of the numerous comments I heard about how meaningful the service was. Additionally, the last question that was discussed during the Faith Formation time asked people to describe their experiences with a discussion-focused worship style. After looking through those sheets – which were full of affirmations – I have no doubt in my mind that the experiment was, indeed, a success.

While planning this service, we hoped to learn how to relate with each other effectively, while also recognizing differences. We also were eager to create a space where people felt safe to share their thoughts, whether it was comfortable or not. Along with that we strived to gain a greater understanding and reasoning for our own views as well as others. As I look back on the service, I believe all of those were achieved.

I appreciate everyone's willingness to participate in this experiment as we continue to discern new ways to foster growth throughout the congregation. I am sure some would say that a regular service with a sermon is the most effective method from which they learn. However, I thank them for joining in the conversation anyway because others are heavily impacted by the meaning they gain from discussion-focused services.

I am in the middle of compiling all of the notes that were taken during the discussions and I will send out a summary of key themes that are common across table groups as soon as I am done.

Even though I was not able to attend every one of the "adult meetings", I really enjoyed having meaningful and productive conversations with my table group. It was so interesting how our table could disagree so strongly on different issues yet still come together and talk about it peacefully, all be friends, and agree on one main fact that our God is an awesome God. It was a busy week, but one packed with fun times, great conversations, and love for the Lord.

Convention was a little different for me this year. It wasn't a specific speaker or worship leader that stood out to me as the highlight. I was at convention acting as the American Sign Language (ASL) Interpreter Coordinator arranging services for all who needed ASL interpretation for any convention events. In the past we have had a team of 4-7 interpreters serving a small group of Deaf individuals. It takes a lot of work to interpret; interpreters usually switch off every 20-30 minutes because of mental fatigue so they usually work in pairs. And it's not just interpreting that's required, but gathering information about what songs will be sung the next day, touching base with speakers to get an idea of their presentation topics and goals, and making sure our lighting and audio is appropriate for us to hear well and be seen. I was coordinating and I knew I would need a minimum of two interpreters, possibly more. As the time drew near we didn't have any Deaf registrants. In fact, I hadn't booked any interpreters and the convention had connected me with the coordinator of the Prayer Team thinking I would be switching to be a member of their team this year instead. Then, on June 13th, three weeks before convention, we got a single registration for a Jr High deaf girl. Yes - this year we had a grand total of one deaf convention attendee. I went to work finding two interpreters with the availability and skills required. One attendee. Three volunteers. At first I wondered if the conference would ask us to make do with less than three volunteers and I found myself wondering how we would make that work. They didn't ask. It reminded we of the parable of the lost sheep. Our deaf attendee had other physical and cognitive challenges as well and I wondered how many people overlook her on a daily basis -- thinking it may not make a difference if she is included, naming their inaction on her behalf as somehow excusable. It's easy to do when someone cannot speak up for themselves, seek assistance, or even request acknowledgement... Not this week. This week a little girl who may be considered one of the least of these, a little lost sheep, was acknowledged, served, loved, and not by one, but three volunteers. The theme of convention was "love is a verb"; MCUSA was setting an example, putting their words into action. What an opportunity my team had as we all three were able to devote time and energy to showing this little girl a small piece of how God loves her, pulling her out of obscurity, and serving her as a valuable and cherished part of convention -- now that's a highlight.
