Friends, we find ourselves in an election year with one month left to go. We are reminded how polarized our world truly is as it demands that we choose a side: Democrat or Republican; conservative or progressive; Trump or Biden.

And yet, as brothers and sisters in God's family, we recognize that there is something much more foundational that we *all* hold in common: We all claim Jesus as Lord of our lives, hearts, minds, and souls. Ultimately, "our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Phil. 3:20).

As citizens of God's Kingdom, we pledge our ultimate allegiance to Jesus. When we are urged to vote for someone who will protect our financial interests, or when so many choose to hoard resources, we pledge our allegiance to the One who said, "store up for yourselves treasures in heaven" and "you cannot serve God and wealth."

When so many scapegoat and place the blame for the world's problems on others while refusing to take responsibility for their own mistakes, we pledge our allegiance to the One who said, "Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye, but do not notice the log in your own?"

When the media or news sources only seem to stir up messages of fear and panic, we pledge our allegiance to the One who said, "Do not worry, for indeed your heavenly Father knows what you need."

As candidates spread lies by saying only what their constituents want to hear in order to garner votes, we pledge our allegiance to the One who said, "Do not swear falsely; let your yes be yes and your no, no." (And who is himself the Truth (John 14:6).)

Rosie's Reflections

I've been thinking about stories and all they bring to our lives. I've been telling the weekly Bible stories for children, and I'm finding that as I retell them, I begin to hear and see new perspectives and insights. Take the story of Abraham and Sarah – I've heard it a "jillion" times, but retelling it reminds me just how frustrated and miserable they must have been not being able to have children so as to fulfill God's promise to them. They must have cried a million tears, enough to fill a bottle and then some, wondering if God was keeping track on his scroll. But then I imagine they both drew on their deep faith as they remembered God's faithfulness to them in more than one way. Just like the Psalmist in Psalm 56:8-11a laments, and then expresses a vow of trust. The story of Abraham and Sarah teaches us to dig deep into our well of faith and trust that God will make a way for us, even when it seems impossible.

I could tell you about the rest of the stories in the upcoming lessons, but I will let you read and view the accompanying videos that Kim sends out each week for our Faith Formation lesson, "God's Treasures in Difficult Times." The adult lesson is there with the same scriptures and Bible stories that the children are getting each week. What a great way for us all to learn together!

I encourage you to join a Faith Formation class on Sunday morning and to let the conversations and study with your brothers and sisters in Christ draw you into deeper relationship with God and each other. I wonder who you identify with in the story. How have you trusted in God and seen his promises fulfilled in your life. What treasures are you finding in these Bible stories?

In a time when so many people act in ways that only benefit themselves and those who think as they do – while dehumanizing anyone who disagrees – we pledge our allegiance to the One who said, "Blessed are the merciful," "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called the children of God," and "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets."

Our worship series for October and November will focus on Jesus' platform as he proclaimed in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7) to remind us of the One to whom we have truly pledged our heart and our allegiance (regardless of our political inclinations). May we live in such a way that proclaims that Jesus is the true Ruler of the world (not any king or president that the world has to offer).

When the world continues to point out what it assumes to be irreconcilable differences between us, may we strive to remember what we have in common with *all* of our brothers and sisters in Christ, for ultimately we are all one in Christ Jesus (Gal. 3:28). And when the world demands that we pick a side, may we boldly proclaim that we have already chosen: our heart and allegiance belongs to the One who broke down the dividing walls between us and who has made us all "citizens with the saints and members of the household of God" (Eph. 2:19).

A year ago, we ran to the hospital to have our baby daughter Emerson. It did not go as planned and after a month in the NICU in Denver we came back home to hearing aids, nasal cannulas, oxygen, pulse oximeters, hand sanitizer, quarantine, special RSV vaccines, OT/PT/Audiology specialists, weekly weigh-ins, bi-weekly trips to Denver - all with a baby struggling to thrive. Six months later to the day, the Roaring Fork Valley locked down and the world joined us in quarantine, right as we were supposed to be getting out of it.



It has been a rough year for us, but now we have a very happy, thriving little one year old! You have all been a big part of helping us get here. We cannot say enough thank-you's for the prayers, financial support, phone calls, text messages, and emails. This support was not only at the beginning but has continued over the past months and into the present.

The donation fund to support Emerson's medical needs raised over \$15,000 and we have secured that for her present and future needs.

MCC Centennial Celebration

Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) in the U.S. is inviting its supporters and the public to join a livestreamed celebration of its 100 years of ministry on Saturday, October 17, starting at 6:50 p.m. (EDT).

'Celebration 2020: MCC at 100' will include videos, storytelling, music, and a message of inspiration from longtime MCC leader and pastor Leonard Dow of Philadelphia.

You can join the celebration at mcc.org/celebration-2020. Video recordings (English and Spanish) will be posted at the same link a few days after the event.

As the keynote speaker, Dow will reflect on the challenges MCC has experienced over the past 100 years and the strengths God developed in the organization as a result. With inspiration from Scripture, he will encourage MCC to use its best self to step boldly into the next century of ministry.

"MCC at its best," Dow says, "has a prophetic imagination. We are patiently persistent, and we have a willingness to get into 'necessary trouble' as we respond to basic human needs and work for peace and justice."

MCC began in 1920 when groups of Mennonites and Mennonite Brethren formed a committee to provide food and other assistance to people affected by war and famine in southern Russia (present-day Ukraine).

Today MCC provides humanitarian relief, encourages sustainable development and strengthens peacebuilding initiatives in more than 50 countries.


