Joy for the Season

I love this time of year. As the fall is turning into winter, the trees look evermore bare as they prepare for a stretch of freezing temperatures. The painted-sky sunsets happen around five o'clock every evening, producing a wonderful array of colors and pictures. Plus, football teams are in their final stretches before the playoffs, making for some excellent action! What I enjoy the most, however, is the anticipation of the holiday season. We just finished Thanksgiving, a time for family and friends, many of whom have not gathered in a while. We celebrate gratitude, a very biblical principle that Jesus practiced often. Once the goodbyes are said, the turkey is packed up in tupperware containers, and the dishes are finished, it is finally time to begin the season in anticipation for Christmas.

Advent is a time filled with anticipation. As a kid, December was always the longest month because I knew Christmas was going to come at the end, meaning I had to stare at the wrapped presents under the tree for three weeks before I would be able to tear them open with joy. This season has more meaning for me now. I now have less anticipation for the gifts and more anticipation for the carols, the fellowship with family, the aroma of coffee and holiday candles as I sit and listen to Christmas music by a fire. Yet this anticipation for the season comes from a deeper wait: as we prepare for the birth of a child, an influential man that not only died for us but showed us how to live a life worthy to God.

Isaiah is filled with imagery of the coming of a Messiah. One of my favorite verses comes from chapter nine, "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace" (v.6). Every time I read this verse, I sing Handel's *Messiah* in my head. There are other predictions of Jesus' coming, one being Mark 1:2-3, "I will send a messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way"—"a voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him."" These

are the words of John the Baptist, who is quoting Malachi 3:1 and Isaiah 40:3.

As we continue on in this time of Advent, I want us to sit in the joy of anticipation and the hope for the beauty of Christmas. We wait for the Lord, who showed us how to live. Let us rejoice in the gladness of the season!
